Shifting Networks of Art and Knowledge

Lectures & Presentations
With Lars Bang-Larsen, Kathryn Weir and Geraldine Juarez
Moderator: Maibritt Borgen

The session discusses the multiplicity of the concept of the network, and how it is both a constant and itself constantly shifting, whether applied to art, technology or the organization of socio-economic flows. Networks can both be carriers of information as well as knowledge-producing forms in themselves. How have artists been taking up network forms and forms of networking, for example to expand their fields of practice or

through new communications media such as the Internet? What is the role of networks in artistic research today, in response to global urgencies? Is there again a need to expand and rethink, to shift the networks of art and knowledge? The presentations will look at historical shifts as well as discuss the need to move beyond Western frameworks of knowledge and even beyond the human, in the face of planetary ecological turmoil.

Lars-Bang Larsen

Keynote

Lars Bang Larsen is an art historian and writer based in Copenhagen. He is an adjunct curator at the Moderna Museet in Stockholm. Among his publications are *The Model: A Model for a Qualitative Society* (1968) (2010) and *Networks* (MIT/Whitechapel 2014). His 2011 PhD thesis from the University of Copenhagen investigated relationships among art, psychedelia, connectivity, and cybernetics in the 1960s and 1970s, and their resonances in contemporary art.

Kathryn Weir

Keynote

Kathryn Weir is a curator and writer and artistic director of Madre - museum of contemporary art Donnaregina in Naples. Previously director of cultural development at the Centre Pompidou, she created Cosmopolis there in 2015 as a platform for research-based and collaborative art practices. Among numerous curatorial activities, she also launched the annual event MOVE: performance, dance, moving image at the Centre Pompidou in 2017.

Geraldine Juárez

Geraldine Juárez is a Mexican-Swedish artist working with time-based media, sculpture and performance about histories, imaginaries and materials involved in the social production of technological culture. Geraldine holds an MFA in Fine Art from Valand Academy and studied ceramics in HDK-Academy of Design and Crafts in Gothenburg, Sweden.

Alternatives & Interdependencies in Constructing Future Networks

This session zooms in on the effort to build alternative network structures in and through art and research, within as well as outside institutions. It asks how the needs for both diversity and coherence can be reconciled within networks, discussing intimacy and interdependence in contrast to the often outsourced and instrumental nature of the digital. How may digital and computational tools be used artistically and at the same time to create alternative forms of the future? Efforts in this field are today underway across all artistic disciplines, responding to how artificial intelligence and data-driven culture impacts all spheres of life. The session will present reflections and work that consider these transformations in artistic forms while also addressing how to construct interdependent networks that are both intimate and sustainable.

Nishant Shah

Keynote

Dr. Nishant Shah is the Director of Research and Outreach and Professor of Aesthetics and Cultures of Technology at the ArtEZ University of the Arts, The Netherlands. He is former Director of Research (2009- 2014) at the Centre for Internet and Society, Bangalore, India. He consults in his individual capacities with private Internet corporations and advises Internet Governance debates representing the issues and questions of the Global South towards building inclusive, participatory, and open societies.
